

My Dear Sisters in the League

This year, 2020, we celebrate the 100th anniversary of the formation of our national organization, The Catholic Women's League of Canada. Because of the COVID-19 Pandemic, we do not know whether we will be able to come together at some point in 2020 to celebrate this milestone, but let each of us celebrate this great organization by reading the history of the CWL. You will find it on the CWL website cwl.ca. From there go to Manuals, and under the National Manual of Policies and Procedures, on page 11, you will read the historical background on the formation of the CWL. Then under the same heading Manuals "click on 1990-2005 Supplement to League History. It's a most interesting read. I feel so honoured to be a part of this dynamic organization.

After the first convention, which was held in Montreal, June 17th 1920, "more than 100 councils were organized across Canada within the next year, by women travelling across Canada, visiting small and large centres in every diocese, inspired by the motto 'For God and Canada'". (National Manual of Policies and Procedures, pg. 11) The Pembroke Diocesan Council was formed in 1921, along with 4 parish councils – St. John Chrysostom, Arnprior, St. James the Less, Eganville, St. Columbkille, Pembroke and St. Francis Xavier, Renfrew. In 2020 we have 30 parish councils.

In 1891, Pope Leo XII's papal encyclical, *Rerum Novarum*, called for workers to have right to dignity, form unions, and to just wages and fair working conditions. This encyclical planted the seed for the formation of the Catholic Women's League, which sprouted and grew over the next 30 years. The quest for social justice has always been a part of the CWL mandate. As we enter into our second century, and are carving out our new strategic plan, let us remember the work that our fore mothers accomplished, and continue to work for Faith, Service and Social Justice.

2019

- 15 councils had a treasurer.
- 8 treasurers were elected, and 7 treasures were appointed.
- 7 treasurers were members of the CWL for 25 years or more.
- The membership fees in all 15 councils remained \$20 for 2019.
- 15 councils retained financial statements for 5 years.
- A variety of booking methods were used.
- 14 councils paid all accounts by cheque.
- 2 signatures are required on all cheques.
- 11 councils prepared and presented a budget to their parish council.
- 14 councils presented financial statements at general meetings.
- 12 councils had their books examined by an independent individual experienced in accounting.

• Diocesan Executive presented The CWL Strategic Plan throughout the diocese. Over 80 parish council members attended. There was positive response to the strategic plan.

- Councils throughout the diocese held prayer sessions for 12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care in May.
- Diocesan executive completed presentations on the executive positions with presentations at the spring meeting on Communications and Education and Health and at the annual convention on the Treasurer and President positions.
- Pembroke Diocesan Annual Convention was hosted by St. Michael's CWL Council, Douglas. St Michael's Council was celebrating its 80th anniversary. Over 100 delegates attended and heard a motivating presentation from then OPC President-Elect Colleen Perry titled "We Can Make A Difference". Author Phil Small spoke about his book On the Way to Here: Reflections on Things that Matter. Three councils were presented with anniversary certificates. In keeping with National's theme, Care for Our Common Home, a collection was held and a donation of \$1700 was made to Water First organization.
- Diocesan Executive held a one day retreat in Eganville. Father Ken O'Brien led the retreat. We contemplated the CWL Mission and how members can live the mission through prayer and action.
- A Day of Reflection was held in September for all councils in the diocese.
 Two CWL members, Carol Sulpher and Betty Ross spoke about "The
 Genius of Women" with reference to saints and women in the bible to
 demonstrate leadership and actions of women throughout history.
 Combined with this day, we held our annual service for deceased CWL
 members and spiritual advisors.
- At the Diocesan Fall Meeting in October, Anita Bowles from Life Canada spoke on "Loneliness at the End of Life", and Diocesan Community Life Chair Pat Weller, and Education and Health Chair Sheila Bielawski gave an informative presentation titled "A World Without Plastics. Can We Make It Happen?"

Corresponding/Recording Secretary

• The survey indicated that 64% (9) of councils' secretaries were appointed.

- 29% (4) of councils had a recording secretary and 14% (2) had a corresponding secretary.
- 21% (3) of councils had combined corresponding and recording secretary.
- 86% (12) of councils had a copy of the Handbook for Secretaries.
 Secretaries attended 100% of the executive and general meetings.
 Sixty-seven percent of council secretaries took the roll call.
- Copies of the Agenda were distributed 75% of the time.
- The secretary was the signing officer for 67% (8) of the time.
- Fifty-eight percent (7) of council secretaries helped the President with the preparation of the Annual Report.
- Secretaries took minutes of the meeting 100% (12) of the time and distributed the previous meeting minutes for approval.
- The secretary kept a list of the executive with contact information 92% (11) of the time.
- Fifty-eight percent (7) of the secretaries did not have a motion book.

- Twenty-five percent of the executives always gave a written report at the meetings (3) while 33% (4) never did and 42% (5) sometimes did.
- 36% (5) of council secretaries were responsible for sending cards.
- 67% of council secretaries notified members of meetings and events.
- 88% (7) of council secretaries used parish bulletins to notify members about meetings. Other methods used were telephone, e-mail, cell phone/text, parish website, and Facebook.
- Fifty percent (7) of the councils owned the CWL Personal Letter Writing Guide.
- 83% (10) of councils knew the location of their Charter.

To the question "what was your biggest challenge in 2019" councils answered the following:

 writing appropriate messages on cards, difficulty in becoming aware that a member has died or is sick etc. for a card to be sent, and unable to send cards due to lack of funds.

To the question "what was your biggest challenge in completing this survey" councils answered the following:

- the online system was not available.
- too many questions that meant the same thing, finding the time to complete surveys by getting all involved together, no space for comments on some of the questions, in some councils some positions were not filled and questions were not always related to one's Standing Committee or position.

Spiritual Development Committee Report

2019

Parishes Reporting: 20 Sub-chairpersons: 0

Spiritual Growth of Members

• 69% of councils reflected on the theme at meetings.

- 62% of councils spend one third of the time on the spiritual aspect at meetings.
- 100% of councils had deceased member prayer services and most also had funeral honor guards.
- 92% had Masses said and recited the League Prayer.
- 69% attended World day of Prayer.
- 54% had Scripture Reflections.
- 46% had seasonal prayers and said the rosary/living rosary.
- 39% had crowning of Mary ceremony; 23% said the Divine Mercy. 23% attended stations of the cross; 23% had visual displays.
- 15% attended adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and 15% had intercessions and novenas while 8% had litanies and retreats.
- Councils used the "Word Among Us" booklet and had guest speakers on Palliative Care, dementia, friendly churches, and "Silent No More".
- 56% of councils used the Living with Christ Missal in their Spiritual Development.
- 33% of Councils used Lectio Divina, Vatican Website and Word on Fire with Bishop Barron.
- When developing liturgies and spiritual programs other councils used: 67% CWL Ceremonies Booklet, 56% CWL Prayer Booklet, 56% the "Word Among Us" magazine, 22% Prayers and workshops for women of peace and hope, 11% St. Anthony Messenger magazine.
- 85% of councils celebrated the Feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel on April 26 with a Mass and 15% had a luncheon.
- 46% of Spiritual Advisors sometimes attended council meetings,
 23% attended most of the time and 8% always attended.
- 31% of members attended Mass before or after a council meeting.

Study of Catholic Teaching

- 44% of councils enrolled in lay formation programs or retreats to study non-violence and ways to show support for our indigenous.
- One council had a retreat at Stillpoint House of Prayer; another had a Lenten retreat; and another had a Women's Retreat led by Madonna House at Graphite Bible Camp.
- Some councils had regular monthly inner reflections others had a study of Maxims Spiritual Direction and Catholic Christian Book study.

Role of Women in the Church

- 39% of councils studied women in scripture.
- 33% promoted awareness of women's place in church and society found in scripture.
- 69% of women were members of parish pastoral councils, and 54% were of diocesan council/committees; 46% were of Parish finance committees; and 39% were of parish committee chairpersons.

Evangelization and Mission Assistance

- 49 % of councils participated in the Knights of Columbus "Keep Christ in Christmas" campaign.
- 39% councils supported and had a subscription to Catholic Missions in Canada Magazine.
- 100% of councils supported Canadian Missions by donating food, clothing, school supplies and monetary donations.

Lay Ministries

- Participation in Lay Ministries indicated:100% choir/music, 85% Eucharistic ministers and lectors, 69% cleaning and decorating, 31% facilitators, 54% ushers, hospitality and sacristans, and 62% catechists.
- Ministries chaired/organized by a CWL member: 33% catechist, 58% choir/music and cleaning, 50% lectors and decorating, 33% Eucharistic minister, 33% hospitality and sacristan, 8% ushers.
- Ministries where Spiritual Development chairs participated: 44% catechist, 56% choir/music, 11% cleaning and decoration, 22% Eucharistic minister and usher, 33% facilitator and lector, 44% hospitality, and 11% sacristan.

Ecumenism and Interfaith Endeavors

- 100% of councils invited women to council meetings and social events from other churches and other faiths.
- 85% of councils participated in World Day of Prayer, 23% in the WUCWO Day in May and 23% of councils participated in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Organization Standing Committee Report

2019

Diocese: Pembroke Chairperson: Elaine Turner Parishes Reporting: 12 Sub-chairpersons: none

Recruit Members and Maintain Membership

- Membership in the 12 councils varied from 109 to 21 members.
- Most of our members were in the 51-70 and over 70 age brackets.
- All of the 12 councils participated in fund raising events, meetings, social events and Spiritual events.
- In 2019 there were 17 new members in our diocese. In 2018 there were 47.
- There was only one new member under the age of 40 in 2019.
- All 12 councils (100%) recruited members by personal invitations. 75%
 (9) advertise in bulletin boards and provide envelopes in parish collection boxes as well.
- Twenty women did not renew their membership. This number mainly includes members who have either died or moved.
- Sixty-seven percent (6) councils made a personal contact to invite the rest back.
- 92% (11) kept in touch with former members by sending cards and 83% (10) visit also.
- To recognize members for their great work, 100% (12) councils presented service pins and 50% (6) held luncheons, teas or other special events.
- Fifty-eight percent (7) administered renewals manually.
- In some parishes women who have been successful candidates in the Parish's RCIA Program received free membership for one year and senior women who forgot to renew membership had their membership paid by most councils.
- 83% (10) councils hold welcoming meetings each year to engage new members.
- Our councils take great pride in stating that they welcome all women of all age groups and cultures.

Leadership Development

- In 2019 twenty-seven percent (3) participated in League development days.
- Forty-nine members from our twelve councils participated in the 2019 diocesan convention.
- Twenty-nine members participated in the 2019 diocesan retreat days.
- Sixteen members participated in 2019 leadership workshops.
- Eight members participated in the 2019 provincial convention.
- 67% (8) councils participated in a planning strategically session provided for them.
- 55% (6) councils set annual goals/plans that included members' input.
- Five of the 12 councils had members who played a role on another level of the League. That was mainly at the diocesan level.
- 67% (8) councils strived to accommodate the 90 minute meeting protocol with a one-third dedication to each of the faith, fun and fulfilment aspects.

League Resource Material

- One hundred percent (12) of our councils had the Canadian League on hand.
- 92% (11) of our councils had both Constitution & Bylaws and League Prayers on hand.
- 83% (10) of our councils had the following in hand: CWL Prays,
 Ceremonies Booklet, League Prayers, Executive Handbook, and National Manual of Policy & Procedure.
- 100% (12) of our councils presented service pins and 50% had a welcome brochure.

Annual Reports

- 64% (7) of the chairpersons of annual reports used guidelines to assist members in completing reports.
- Ten out of 12 councils reviewed minutes to complete reports and 8 also met as a group.

Life Memberships

Five councils out of 12 have life members in their parishes and the five councils agree that their councils benefit greatly from them.

Additional:

N.B. These survey results do not reflect the truth about all the great members' works in our diocese. We have 30 councils not just 12. I witnessed 2 members completing & forwarding their reports and noticed they are not included in these results. These two members are very computer savvy! What happened here???

Christian Family Life Standing Committee Report 2019

Diocese: Pembroke Chairperson: Annette Chaplin

Parishes Reporting: 12 Sub-Chairperson: 0

Marriage and Family

Thirty three percent of reporting councils promoted Marriage Preparation courses; 8% had a program for single parent families; 25% had a way to support people suffering from domestic abuse; 25% attended workshops and/or seminars on the topic of family life; 25% organized events for Mothers' day and for special anniversaries; and 17% celebrated National Family Week and liturgical celebrations for married couples.

Sanctity of Life

Twenty five of reporting councils are members in a pro-life organization; 50% reported having members that attended a life chain; 25% reported having members that attended the march for life, pro-life dinners, and pro-life masses; 17% reported having members that attended pro-life walks; 33% donated money or gifts to support Pregnancy and Family Support Services, and local pro-life organizations; 25% donated to the Euthanasia Prevention Coalition; 8% donated to the Campaign Life Coalition and to Priests for Life; 17% of the councils wrote letters to inform legislators of CWL resolutions on abortion and euthanasia; 8% of councils met with pro-life legislators; 83% regularly pray of the protection of life.

Ministry to Youth

Sixty percent of the councils participated in programs for young people in their parish; 80% of the councils encouraged youth to serve at events; 17% sponsored the NET ministries, summer camps and other youth events; 8% sponsored Catholic Christian Outreach, Girl Guides of Canada, Stuebenville, Sunday school, and World Youth Day.

Ministry to Disabled

Twenty five percent of councils organized or participated in support groups and respite for caregivers; 42% urged communities to make churches and other public buildings more accessible; 33% arranged for a designated space with ease of access for wheelchairs in their church, and 33% supported shelters or programs for the disabled; 92% of councils sent cards; 67% prayed for the disabled, and visited and called the disabled; 58% brought communion to the disabled; 42% gave gifts on special occasions, and 25% organized transportation.

Ministry to Seniors

Eighty three percent of councils involved seniors in CWL events and visited seniors; 75% brought communion, prayed with seniors and sent cards of encouragement; 67% gifted seniors with membership; 58% invited newly retired women to join, and 50% organized social events for seniors and called them; 42% provided transportation; 33% shared a meal; 25% initiated social programs and celebrations, and 8% involved them in intercessory prayer.

Ministry to Widowed

Eighty three percent of councils sent condolence cards, 67% arranged memorial services and/or funeral lunches, and provided prayer and support after the death of the spouse; 50% invited widows to attend CWL meetings and events; 42% invited them to attend community events; 33% visited the widowed, and 25% of councils encouraged participation in parish programs, and contacted the widowed; 8% gifted them with prayer shawls.

Ministry to Separated and Divorced

Seventeen percent of councils attended or sponsored a presentation on the annulment process; 17% purchased copies of the brochure "Annulments Today" and made them available in their church.

Vocations

Eighty three percent of councils participated in prayers for vocations, and 67% sent spiritual bouquets; 17% adopted or supported seminarians and offered mass for vocations; 8% encouraged families to invite priests and religious into their home, hosted luncheons for priests and religious, invited them to speak on vocations and supported travelling chalice/crucifix programs.

Community Life Standing Committee Report

2019

Diocese: Pembroke Chairperson: Pat Weller Parishes Reporting: 11/30 Sub-chairpersons: N/A

Dignity and Rights of Persons

- Councils supported minority groups including those suffering from domestic violence, homelessness, human trafficking and poverty. Support consisted of donations, guest speakers, volunteer work and workshops.
- 3 chairpersons became aware of the struggles of Indigenous women.
- 3 chairpersons became aware of laws and what is being done in the fight against human trafficking. One council arranged for a speaker on Human Trafficking in Renfrew County and had those attending bring gifts of clothes and other items needed by young women who want to escape their situation.

Social and Economic Justice

- Councils focussed on the needs in their communities with support for food banks and soup kitchens, school programs, drop-in centers, emergency shelters for the homeless and for those affected by domestic violence, resource centers for single parents, and violence prevention. Financial and volunteer support was offered as well as prayerful support to all in need.
- One council, assisted by the local Catholic High School, held a monthly Community Friendship meal. It became a time where both seniors and families, regardless of their background, shared a meal that gave nourishment and companionship. Social barriers were broken down and the students involved received a lesson in social and economic justice.

Refugees, Immigration and Citizenship

- Five council chairpersons acknowledged some familiarity with needs of immigrants.
- Four councils reported they would be able to explain the difference between a temporary foreign worker, immigrant, and refugee.
- All councils reported their participation in Remembrance Day services, support of the Royal Canadian Legion poppy campaign, and support of Canadian troops by wearing red on Fridays.

Canadian Catholic Organization for Development & Peace

 At the Fall Diocesan meeting, councils were informed of the Fall 2019 CCODP Campaign For Our Common Home focused on the plight of Indigenous groups in the Amazon and Pope Francis' concern for an integral ecology where both people and the environment are protected. Members were given the CCODP campaign prayer cards and encouraged to say "a prayer for our earth" written by Pope Francis from his encyclical Laudato Si.

Developing Countries

- Councils reported limited study of economic and social conditions in developing countries.
- Councils reported donations to Canadian Food for Children, Holy Childhood Association, Samaritans Purse, Canadian Red Cross, Save a Family Plan and Sleeping Children Around the World.

Recommendations

- Our councils are small and rural and focus much of their efforts in their local communities. They are aware of the broader world picture but this does not always become a topic of study at a council meeting. Where there is a connection to members or the community, there will be action taken. For instance, several councils offer financial support to the Sisters of St. Joseph for educational and other projects in Peru. Members have a personal connection and interest since there is a local congregation of Sisters of St. Joseph in Pembroke Diocese.
- It is incumbent upon us to find the connection that will light the fire of interest so we can "share with others at home and abroad" as we pray in *The League Prayer* and work to address some of the inequities encountered by the poor and disadvantaged where ever they may be found in the world.

Education and Health Report

2019

Parishes Reporting: 14 Sub-chairpersons: N/A

Catholic Education

(i) Catholic Schools and Catechesis

- 6 councils (67%) were informed about the quality of Catholic religious instruction in their parish and in their Catholic schools.
- 5 councils (56%) encouraged parents to participate in all areas of their children's Catholic school education and activities.
- The needs of the Catholic schools were identified as the following: 75% scholarships and bursaries, 50% breakfast and lunch programs, 38% school supplies, 25% tutoring, 13% sacramental development.
- Some volunteers helped students with reading through the L.O.V.E program (Let Older Volunteers Educate), the NET ministries and supported the graduating class.
- 9 councils (64%) were aware of the family life program being taught in their local schools.

(ii) Rites of Christian Initiation

• 2 councils (22%) participated in the Rites of Christian Initiation programs offered in their parish.

Literacy and Continuing Education

• 4 councils (44%) encouraged members to assist those who wished to improve their literary skills.

Scholarships and Bursaries

- 5 councils (36%) had a list of scholarships and bursaries that were available to provide funds to Catholic women.
- 8 councils (57%) provided funds to another bursary or scholarship. 7 councils (88%) provided a bursary to high school students.
- 1 council (13%) provides a bursary to elementary school students.
- 1 council (13%) provided a bursary to university and college students.
- 1 council (7%) promoted the National Bursary fund. Councils supported local hospice facilities, wrote letters regarding resolutions and explained our position on the issues.

Wellness and Sickness

- 1 council (7%) participated in the CWL Mental Health Postcard campaign.
- 3 councils (21%) supported the Canadian Cancer Society, 2 councils (14%) Relay for Life, 1 council (7%) Autism Canada, 1 council (7%) Canadian Mental Health Association, 1 council (7%) MaterCare International.
- A council covered expenses for travel for a cancer patient. Others gave to food banks, church maintenance, and fire victims.
- During Palliative Care week: 7 councils (50%) arranged a prayer space at home, 5 councils (36%) arranged a prayer service in the parish, 3 councils (21%) invited neighbouring parishes, 3 councils (21%) offered refreshments and time for fellowship, 2 councils (14%) shared their experiences of palliative care and discussed ways to assist in care.

Environment

- 9 councils (64%) participated in the CWL Water Pledge Challenge Campaign.
- Councils made members aware of ways to save water. 2 Councils (14%) studied resolution 2004.07 Water Use in Canada and 2001.04 Water Quality in Canada. 1 council (7%) studied 1999.09 Bulk Fresh Water Resources.
- Environmental issues that were addressed by councils were: 11 Councils (79%) reduced the use of Styrofoam cups, 10 councils (71%) recycled, 9 councils (64%) reduced water use, 8 councils (57%) eliminated plastic bottles, 3 councils (21%) use green bins for organic waste, 3 councils (21%) reduced paper use, 2 councils (14%) compost, 1 council (7%) participated in roadside or community clean-up, 1 council (7%) studied climate change.

Genetics

 5 councils (56%) rated their knowledge in regard to the advantages and disadvantages of technology to alter genes in light of the teaching of the Catholic Church as poor, 3 councils (33%) rated it as good and 1 council (11%) rated it as very good. Many felt that more information is required to know ways to approach the topic.

The Canadian League Magazine

Ten out of the 13 (77%) councils reported that the Canadian League Magazine was useful as a resource for ideas and spirituality. Eleven councils mainly used the magazine for oral reports, quoting such features as The President's Message (6), Listen to Silence (4), The League Objects (4), Highlights from the 99th Convention (4), Dignity and Rights of Persons (4), Human Trafficking in Canada(4), as well as The Power of Prayer, and a 10-minute prayer service for meetings.

Media: for Evangelization

Methods used for evangelization: church bulletins (12) 92% of councils, telephone committees (8) 62% of councils, bulletin inserts and posters (7) 54%, church bulletin boards and local newspapers (6) 46%, and e-mail (5) 39%.

Media: to Promote the League

Methods used to promote the League: (3) 23% of councils used Salt + Light "Woman on a Mission" with two councils rating it very good and one good. The CWL's Testimonial Video was viewed by three councils and it was rated very good by 2 councils and good by one. Six (46%) councils encouraged members to monitor media content.

Media: Evaluation and Promotion of Good Content

Five (39%) of the reporting councils produced newsletters and bulletins that were prepared by either the president or the secretary. They were produced annually (3), monthly (1), quarterly (1) and some were distributed by email and regular mail as well.

Media: Relations

Seven of the reporting councils submitted material for publication. Seven councils also invited the local media to attend an event, and 3 advertised with the media.

Media: Newsletter and Bulletins

Five (39%) of the reporting councils produced newsletters and bulletins that were prepared by either the president or the secretary. They were produced annually (3), monthly (1), quarterly (1) and some were distributed by email and regular mail as well.

Pornography

Some of the reporting 13 councils continued to be kept informed about the influence that pornography continues to have on children and adults. Five councils read newspaper articles, 3 reviewed current legislation, 1 contacted agency, and 1 viewed the website fightthenewdrug.org.

Two of the reporting councils participated in using the "Pornography Hurts" post cards. One used the "Over 18" documentary and held information sessions.

No councils acted on Resolutions 2017.02. and 2004.11 but 7 councils acted on Resolution 2002.11.

Website and Strategic Planning

Sixty-nine percent of councils shared the strategic planning information at their meetings. More than 50 percent of the councils shared information from the National website and in the Canadian League magazine relating to the strategic plan. Four councils prayed the Prayer for Renewal at meetings.

Comments regarding the website: found it informative; managed to find what I needed; found it well organized and accessible. Other comments were: not user friendly; would like to access all programs without leaving to go to Facebook.

One council published a weekly article in the local newspaper informing about CWL events and spiritual thoughts.

Biggest challenge for communication: need to use a variety of tools to reach all members; finding the time to research and study all of the material in communiques and newsletters from National and Provincial.

Monitor and Study Legislation at All Levels of Government

- Only two councils of the reporting 11 councils had the position of the Legislation Standing Committee Chairperson filled and both were appointed.
- Presidents or some other council executive members volunteered to do the remaining 9 surveys.
- It is interesting to note that five of the volunteer responders have held this Standing Committee position previously.
- The two appointed Legislative Standing Committee Chairpersons knew all the names of the local municipal, provincial and the federal government representatives and received mailings from the local municipal, provincial and federal representatives regularly.
- Both the two chairpersons of the Legislation Standing Committee were somewhat informed about the issues being discussed by the government at all levels municipally, provincially, and federally.
- One of the two chairpersons accessed "Hansard", the printed record of the proceedings of federal government.
- Six of the eleven councils reported some knowledge of federal bills that were monitored nationally i.e. Bill C-57 An Act to amend the Federal Sustainable Development Act.

- Seven of the reporting councils had some knowledge of the federal bill named Bill C-418 Protection of the Freedom of Conscience Act. But it is interesting to note that two councils were very aware of this bill.
- Sixty-four percent of the 11 councils reporting, approved of the adoption of Resolution 2018.03 Legislate Designation of Hospice/Palliative Care Services in Facilities to Exclude Medical Assistance in Dying.

Historian's Report

Serve in a Consultative Capacity

- The Past President position was filled in 77% of parish councils mainly by long-time members with some repeats in the age 55 & over.
- 60% of Past Presidents attended executive & general meetings.
- 50% of Past Presidents attended spiritual and social events most of the time while 30 % always did so.
- 60% of Past Presidents were called upon for advice at least once a month. 80% of parish presidents felt supported by the Past President.

Be Responsible for Archives and History

- Parish council archives were the responsibility of 70% of Past Presidents. 85% of councils stored their archives in the church.
- All councils knew where the council charter is kept.
- 85% of councils stored their archives in labelled photo albums, 77% in filing cabinets, 46% in banking boxes and scrap books with memory sticks beginning to show at 15%.
- The "Book of Life" is kept indefinitely by 92% of councils while 54% kept the history of all deceased members.
- 46% of councils keep financial information indefinitely while 39% keep information for 5-8 years.
- Information on council membership, executives, minutes of executive and general meetings and records of pin and award recipients are kept indefinitely by 77% of parish councils.
- Archives are reviewed as needed by 85% of councils. A history book is maintained by that % of councils also.

Facilitate the Study and Implementation of the *Constitution & Bylaws 2013 (revised)*

- Every council has a copy of the Constitution and Bylaws but rarely uses it to help guide a decision.
- All councils have a copy of the National Manual of Policy and Procedure.
 Most councils rarely consult it to help with processes and procedures.
- 54% of councils have their own manual of Policy and Procedure updating it every five years.
- Diocesan and Provincial executives are rarely consulted for advice. The same goes for National executive and National office.
- Spiritual Advisors and the local Bishop are rarely consulted.
- Life members are rarely asked for advice.

Diocesan Highlights

- Support for the implementation of the envisioned future of the League through Planning Strategically 2018-2020 was yes from 69% of councils.
- Several information sessions were held across the diocese to inform members of the Strategic Plan.
- Members were kept informed through resources like: The Canadian League magazine. Regular visits to the National and Provincial websites were encouraged.
- Many councils across the diocese participated in "12 Hours of Prayer" for palliative care and mental illness.
- St. Michael's CWL, Douglas, hosted the Annual Diocesan Convention in May, 2019. Theme: Homelessness and Increase Membership and Promote Leadership.
- Several members from the diocese attended the July Provincial Convention in Kingston. Theme: Homelessness.
- On Sept. 21, 2019, over 80 members attended the Annual Day of Reflection held in St. John Chrysostom parish, Arnprior. Theme: The Genius of Women celebrated through prayer, hymns, informative presentation by Carol Sulpher and Betty Ross and Reconciliation followed by a memorial prayer service for deceased members and Spiritual Advisors.

Recommendations

- Develop your own council Policy and Procedure manual and keep it updated regularly. This will ensure success when council executives change. Include new and seasoned members on the P&P committee.
- Council archives are extremely important so make it a priority to keep them updated and in a safe place. Share them on occasion within your parish at meetings and special events.
- As mentor, support and encourage your future leaders.
