Gathered in Circle for Drumming and Power Point Presentation

Members from across Pembroke Diocese gathered in Renfrew at Our Lady of Fatima Parish Hall on Saturday, September 23 for the annual Diocesan Day of Reflection. Seated in a circle, members listened and watched drumming by the women from Bonnechere Inodewizin Abinodjinish Kikinamagan (BIAK).

Interspersed with the drumming, was a presentation by Dr. Emilie Pigeon, Assistant Professor at Our Lady Seat of Wisdom College in Barry's Bay "Comparing Ojibway and Catholic Spiritualities".

Maintaining the spiritual nature of the day, the afternoon presented an opportunity for the Sacrament of Reconciliation followed by a Memorial Service for deceased members.

Our lunch was complimented by a choice of hearty soups and a dessert of apple crisp, kindly provided by Our Lady of Fatima CWL members.

These women are members of the Bonnechere Algonguin First Nation, а community within the Algonquins of Ontario. The group is part of a mobile unit that travels to different locations in Renfrew County offering free drumming and teaching circles under the "EarlyON Education Program", a part of the County of Renfrew Child Care and Early Years Division. They educate children and their families on the Algonquin culture, language, drumming, crafts, and storytelling. They also participate and share their culture at other community events such as our Day of Reflection.

Time was allotted for questions. We learned that the women made their own regalia and drums from hides of moose, deer, or elk. We were told that if a drum has been made of bear skin, it was not used in the winter so it doesn't wake bears from hibernation. The drummers began with a welcoming song and ended with a safe travelling song. Some of aifted their songs were from other Indigenous groups. They talked about the sacred circle, the four directions and what the four colours represent to them, and their of the following Seven Grandfathers Teachings (humility, bravery, honesty, wisdom, truth, respect, and love).

Dr. Emilie Pigeon highlighted the similarities between Ojibway and Catholic spiritualities such as the belief in one Creator, a flood story, belief in a spirit in all things, the existence of good and evil, life after death, and a strong prayer life, to name a few.

Dr. Pigeon's material is based on the work of Dan F. Jerome, a Chippewa-Michif elder, educator, artist, and musician from North Dakota with whom she has had a professional working relationship.

In addition to teaching, Dr. Pigeon also works for and with Indigenous Communities assisting in research in defence of treaty rights and political interests. She also sits with the Truth and Reconciliation group for the Diocese of Pembroke.
